

As I worked my daughter's paver-stone patio, shoveling yards and yards of dirt, gravel, and sand and carefully cutting and placing each of its countless blocks, I was reminded that this too was masonry, although of the operative type.

On the long drive back to Tucson I realized that although I had left Tucson to, "get away from it all", Masonry had become such an important and indelible part of my psyche. I spent the whole month of July with Free Masonry on the brain in one way or another throughout the trip. I am proud to be a Mason and excited to get back to work with Tucson #4 and be with my home lodge brothers again.

From The Secretary




At the annual communication an increase of four dollars (\$4) in the annual per-capita was approved. Our lodge By-Laws (Article IX, Section 1) spells this out by saying "In addition to Grand Lodge percapita and any special assessments, the dues of each member of this Lodge shall be eighty-four dollars (\$84.00) per year. The sum of Grand Lodge per-capita, special assessments, and Lodge dues are payable in advance." For 2020 this means our dues will be \$122 (\$126 if paying by PayPal). This equates to \$84 (dues) + \$38 (per-capita) for a total of \$122. The extra \$4 for PayPal is to cover their transaction fees.
