### FROM THE SOUTH

Brethren,

As the summer winds down, it is customary to reflect upon the books we read over our holidays. Along the same line, I think it is appropriate that we take a moment and revisit some of the seminal texts of our Craft and relearn their timeless lessons.

I wish to share two passages related to the symbolism of the plumb and the position of the Junior Warden in the Lodge. The first comes from 'The Symbolism of Freemasonry' by A.G. Mackey (first published in 1882), and the second from 'The Meaning of Masonry' by W.L. Wilmshurst (first published in 1922). Let's look at what these passages are trying to tell us in pursuit of spiritual perfection.

"The plumb is a symbol of rectitude of conduct and inculcates that integrity of life and undeviating course of moral uprightness which can alone distinguish the good and just man. As the operative workman erects his temporal building with strict observance of that plumb-line, which will not permit him to deviate a hair's breadth to the right or to the left, so the speculative Mason, guided by the unerring principles of right and truth inculcated in the symbolic teachings of the same implement, is steadfast in the pursuit of truth, neither bending beneath the frowns of adversity nor yielding to the seductions of prosperity."

"Midway between the Master – light from the East – and the 'Moon' in the West is placed the Junior Warden in the South, symbolizing the third greater light, the 'Sun'. And, masonically, the 'sun' stands for the illuminated human intelligence and understanding, which results from the material brain-mind being thoroughly permeated and enlightened by the Spiritual Principle; it denotes these two in a state of balance and harmonious interaction, the junior Warden personifying the balance-point or meeting-place of man's natural reason and his spiritual intuition. Accordingly, it is he who, as representing this enlightened mental condition, asserts in the Second Degree (which is the degree of personal development where that condition is theoretically achieved) that he has been enabled in that degree to discover a sacred symbol placed in the center of the building and alluding to the G.A.O.T.U. What is meant is, of course, that the man who has in reality (and not merely ceremonially) advanced to the second degree of self-development has now discerned that God is not outside him, but within him and overshadowing his own "building" or organism; a discovery which he is thereupon urged to follow up with fervency and zeal so that he may more and more closely unify himself with this Divine Principle. This, however, is a process requiring time, effort and self-struggle."

These teachings represent the two sides of a coin. The segment on the plumb sets down and governs our social behavior -- external -- to live a life of unflagging rectitude. In contrast, the description of Junior Warden's position points to our personal endeavor -- internal -- to seek the Divine Light in ourselves. One tells us what we must do, and the other why.

#### MASONIC MUSINGS ON MORTALITY

#### Old Age Is Coming To You – Pope

Old age is coming to you, my Brother, dark shadowed on the swift wings of time.

Thinking about how to imagine looking back on my life in the future when near death, forced me to consider what was important to do in life then and going forward to consider looking at backwards in my past imagined future.

Alexander Pope (born 21 May 1688 – died 30 May 1744) was an English poet, satire author, and translator in London, England. Swift became an absolute expert in satiric deadpan, ironic style of writing essays and books. Pope was a colleague and friend of satirist Jonathan Swift. Some of Pope's work included The Rape of the Lock, An Essay on Criticism, The Dunciad, An Essay on Man, and his premier translation of the Roman author Homer's work into English. Pope edited some lines of Shakespeare's work as well.

Rendering to AI, "Alexander Pope was a Freemason. He was a member of Lodge No. 16, which met at the "Goat at the Foot of the Haymarket" tavern in London. This lodge was constituted in 1729. Jonathan Swift was also a member of this lodge. Pope's membership in this specific lodge is well-documented."

Pope was not allowed, due to the laws current at the time preventing those not Catholic Church members from attending universities, teaching, voting, or holding public office. Alexander's aunt taught him to read. Pope later attended Twyford School, in 1698, and two Roman Catholic schools in London illegally. Pope read any available literature ravenously and further educated himself. He is considered one of the most prominent poets of the 18<sup>th</sup> century.

Pope is still frequently quoted for his famous phrases like, "To err is human; to forgive, divine"; 'Fools rush in where angels fear to tread;"; "A little learning is a dangerous Thing;" "If you want to know what God thinks about money just look at the people He gives it to;" "You purchase pain with all that joy can give and die of nothing but a rage to live;" and "Blessed is he who expects nothing, for he shall never be disappointed."

Pope's most well-known poem is, The Rape of the Lock. It is a satire a ridiculous high-society dispute where an English Lord clipped a lock of hair from a so-called Lady's head, but without her permission. The crux of the poem mocks the waste of useful human endeavor to focus on frivolous, non-productive pursuits by the gentry in the then current-time English society. I encourage you to read it.

Pope's An Essay on Criticism, chastised other poets who placed excessive value on following rhyme and meter in poetry from ancient poets and 18<sup>th</sup> century government rules to write poetry, than on more recent thoughts, topics, and innovative ideas. It is another work of useful, and relevant satire.

Brother Pope spent years translating the ancient original text written by Homer from the epic ancient poems, The Iliad, and *The Odessey*. They remain the best translations available.

Pope created a subscription series for his volumes of *The Iliad*. He published one each year for six years. Alexander Pope was paid 200 guineas for each volume. That was a lot of money in his era of life!


Pope had tuberculosis in his spine at 12 years old. It affected his health throughout his life. He died at the age of 56. He always lived as he wanted. He left a great legacy. He was a great man and a great Mason.

According to Wikipedia, "when told by his physician, on the morning of his death, that he was better, Alexander Pope replied: 'Here am I, dying of a hundred good symptoms.' He died at his villa surrounded by friends on 30 May 1744, about eleven o'clock at night. On the previous day, 29 May 1744, Pope had called for a priest and received the Last Rites of the

Catholic Church. He was buried in the nave of St Mary's Church,

Twickenham."

Alexander Pope died 281 years ago. You might take a moment now to ponder what some Mason in the future can say about the life you led in a brief article 281 years from now.

I found this quote on my niece's Facebook page. She is a certified ophthalmic surgical technician, a town council woman, and owns her own photography business. She is wise beyond her years and a very loving wife and mother. Her comment on this post is that "it's going to live rentfree in my head". I heartily agree.

We are now approaching the last third of the year and as I usually do at this time, I give an update on our membership. We started the year with 208 members. We lost two to the celestial lodge above, had one demit, and another suspended for non-payment of dues in another jurisdiction (so he is suspended here as well). On the plus side, we raised one new master mason, had one affiliate, and another reinstated. We have conferred 5 degrees, 1 Entered Apprentice, 3 Fellowcraft and 1 Master Mason. As of this writing, we have 207 members on the books. To further break this down, we have 26 Senior Life Members, 11 relief, and 39 Perpetual Members who we have to pay per capita on. Doing the math, this leaves us with 131 members who are dues payers. Of these 131 members, we have 4 who have not yet paid their dues, one of which has already responded that he no longer wants to be a member of the craft. These 4 brothers will be suspended at the September stated meeting if I do not receive their dues.

Since our June stated meeting, we have had 10 pieces of mail come back as undeliverable, return to sender. Brothers, if you move, or change your email or phone number, please let me know. If you have activated your account in Grandview, you can update your own contact information. If you haven't, please drop a note to me. Next month, I will have an attachment on how to activate your Grandview account. This is important as we are going to electronic dues cards next year. On a case-by-case basis, I can and will print a paper dues card for those who don't have a smart phone.

I have received the latest copy of the Arizona Masonic Code which includes everything that was passed at the Annual Communication in June (plus a couple of items that were left out from prior years). I will be sending this out via the email list later this week. If you are not on the list, I will send you an electronic copy upon request.

Over the last several weeks, I have received several emails purportedly from the Master, asking if you had a minute. If you replied, you would receive a request to pick up several gift cards for some nefarious reason. Needless to say, he never sent these out. If you do send out a request like this, it will be a formal request, with the lodge banner, through our usual method (same source as the trestle board).

I have also been working on our list of brothers who are deserving of longevity awards. The plan is to have them presented by our own MW Leigh Creighton on Wednesday, October 15th. Looking at the list, we have a lot of 50 year awards of gold. We have a 75 year member living in California. We will request a presentation be made to him.

I am trying to keep regular hours, but my wife's doctors appointments (after 3 surgeries in 5 months) drive the schedule. I am always available by email, text, and phone, and can set up appointments.


