

Masonry admonishes us to meet on the level, persevere in our rectitude of life, and live our lives based upon the square of morality and truth. When we are able to restrain our passions, be resolute in our desire to follow the tenets of Masonry, judiciously conduct our lives, and practice justice in our dealings with all man, especially our brother Masons, we will make ourselves "Better Men"!

The principle of Justice was defined long before the Grand Lodge of England was formed in 1717. Marcus Tullius Cicero, (106 BC –43 BC) was a Roman statesman, lawyer, scholar, and philosopher who concluded that the principles of justice are fourfold;

A. do not initiate violence without good reason;

B. keep one's promises;

- C. respect people's private property and common property; and
- D. be charitable to others within one's means.

He also said, and this may be applicable to judiciously conducting our lives, that "Any man can make mistakes, but only an idiot persists in his error."

One might conclude that if Cicero wrote this over 2,000 years, humans in general may be slow learners, but as Masons, we are actively embracing the concept of becoming "Better Men" through the Fraternity of Free Masonry.



TUCSON 4 WIDOWS

Traditionally we have had our Widows' Luncheon in April or May. This year, due to scheduling conflicts and other considerations we have moved it to September.

We presently have 45 widows of members and long time sojourners to the lodge. Thirty-five of them live within the greater Tucson area. In the past we had a Widows' Assistance Program which was designed to assist them with handyman type work, or being able to offer them advice when they had to have major work done. Our assistance program was the source of the revamp of the Grand Lodge Widows' Program back in the late 90s. From The South



Who was Prince Hall, you may wonder....was he a real person? According to *Little Books About Big Things; Freemasons,* Prince Hall was a free black male living in the Boston area before the Revolutionary War began. Prince Hall, along with 14 other free black men, were introduced to the Irish Lodge No 441, which was associated with the British Infantry stationed within the colonies in 1775.

Masons in the US were now accepting for the first time, men of color. In 1776, as the British military were leaving, Prince Hall with his new Brethren were extended the right to form their own Masonic Lodge, that included certain rights and privileges, and Prince Hall was named its first Master.

The new lodge petitioned the Grand Lodge of England in 1784 for the full rights of all Free and Accepted Masons, as all things Masonic still stemmed from England, even after the war. African Lodge No 459 of Boston was officially chartered, and became so successful, that Prince Hall was named the Provincial Grand Master and continued on with founding African Lodge No 459 in Philadelphia and Hiram Lodge No 3 in the Providence Rhode Island.

African Grand Lodge No 1 in Boston was changed to Prince Hall Grand Lodge in 1807, after Prince Hall's death, in his honor. As a result, the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts now has more than 5,000 Masonic lodges and at least 47 Grand Lodges that can trace their origin directly back to it.

Besides being recognized within the Masonic Community, Prince Hall was also very active in the fight against slavery and establishing schools for the black community. President George Washington also crossed paths with Prince Hall when he was petitioned to extend the right to join the colonial army for free black men.

"Modern Freemasonry from its very beginning have been populated by men of good character who are civic-minded, charitable, and dedicated to the service of others." (Mucker, 2013)

LOOKING FOR "LIGHT"



BY-LAWS CHANGES

Back at the February stated meeting we voted on several proposed amendments to our by-laws.
