## TO THE STUDY OF GEOMETRY The Equilateral Triangle

The equilateral triangle has been viewed as symbol of deity in all ancient societies across the globe. (See Figure 1) It is composed of three equal lines joined at an intersection of three equal angles of 60 degrees. (See Figure 2) The equilateral triangle is present as a symbol within every Masonic lodge. It is foremost among the many types of triangles studied in Freemasonry. For example, notice the arrangement of the three lesser lights beside the central alter in each room assumes special geometric lodge this configuration. Even the placement of the three principal offices and their respective stations equal or approximate an equilateral triangle intentionally. The Window Rock sculpture by the front door of our lodge shows this formation also.

The equilateral triangle is the emblem and essence of geometry. It was a foundation for the study of geometry by Euclid. In Euclid's Book I the equilateral triangle is its very first proposition. Since antiquity the equilateral triangle has been the symbol for geometry as a science as well as one for deity. Ancient Greeks used this symbol for delta or the letter "D." In the time of Pythagoras, the most important oaths invoked the equilateral triangle for their administration. Oaths given over this symbol of deity were considered sacred and never broken. Opening compasses to the angle of 60 degrees represents invocation of deity in Masonic ritual work for like reasons when we exemplify Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason ceremonies.



The equilateral triangle presents the most stable and strongest of triangular designs. It is the foundation of the three degrees in Masonry, each degree being equally-sized and equally-important taken together to make a man a Mason. This perfect, simple triangle teaches us important information with lessons for both operative and speculative Freemasonry. By holding a plumb line atop an equilateral triangle, an operative Mason can determine three fundamental elements used for construction. The plumb line itself shows the vertical. The horizontal can be found where the plumb line shows itself to be equidistant between the other two sides. A right angle appears where the plumb line and base unite. (See Figure 3) These essential measurements enabled the construction of the great pyramids of Egypt, King Solomon's magnificent temple and medieval cathedrals and castles. For the speculative Mason the strength and stability of the equilateral triangle, along with the life lessons of the plumb, level and square, informs and reminds us of our multiple duties and obligations owed to our God, our country, our family, our brethren and ourselves. To the study of geometry, therefore, your attention is especially directed.



Younger, "upwardly mobile" men with families and resulting obligations as to time and finance will no longer join or remain with an organization that does not meet some need in their lives. and they definitely will affiliate with us content to be sideliners with no role to fill or challenge to meet. Those days are gone.

Thus, it is imperative that we treat each new ... Mason ... not as a member whose name is written in stone but as a good man who is trying us out - giving us a chance so to speak. Will he like what he sees? Will he find a welcoming group of Masons eager to involve him, hear his opinions and use his talents? Will he be given a chance to exercise real leadership and to be proud to bring his friends and acquaintances? Will we remember not to patronize him with worn out slogans as "you only get out of it what you put into it" but ask him to do a specific job and praise him for his performance?

This isn't rocket science, folks. It's easy. It's the right thing to do, and what we promised to do as Masons. If we don't reach out and engage our members, they will be gone and another chair will be empty at the next meeting.


