- March 29-31 are the Borrowing Days. According to lore, the last three days of March have a reputation for being stormy.

The most common name for March's full Moon (March 9th) is the Full Worm Moon. At this time of the year, the ground begins to soften enough for earthworm casts to reappear, inviting robins and other birds to feed—a true sign of spring. Roots start to push through the soil, and their way up Earth experiences a re-birth as it awakens from its winter slumber. There are many alternative names for the March Moon, however. One such name was the Full Sap Moon, as this is the time of year when the sap of sugar maples starts to flow.






Grand Lodge Scholarships

(From the Secretary's Desk)

Applications for the 2020-2021 Grand Lodge Scholarships are available from the Secretary. The deadline for completing the application, including the required documents, is April 1, 2020. Applications will be submitted to the secretary who will review them for completeness and forward them to the scholarship committee.

Applicants must meet one of the following criteria: be the son, daughter, grandson, or granddaughter of an Arizona mason in good standing, or be an Arizona member (or an Arizona senior/majority member) of the Order of DeMolay, Rainbow Girls, or Job's Daughters. The applicant must use the scholarship to a school of higher learning within the state of Arizona, unless the major course of study is not offered within the state of Arizona. The applicant must be a full time student in an undergraduate program (and carry a minimum of 12 semester hours).
