# From The Secretary



Ah, November, that time of year when the trees start to turn, and the night time gets colder. That time of year when you try to decide if you want to turn off the air conditioner or not. It is also that time of year when you have to bump the hot water heater up a little and the "C" on the faucet no longer means caliente, but instead cold like the rest of the country.

It is also that time of year, since time immemorial, when the secretary announces DUES ARE NOW DUE! [Actually they are payable by December 31st]. In a perfect world it would be nice if everyone could pay by then, and you won't have to listen to me nag. I have received our 2024 dues cards and they are a beautiful slate blue in color. I have started signing them (as of writing this I am through the "Rs"). Once I do that, I will need to put the seal on them and start distributing them. The first set will go out to our Perpetual Members, Senior Life Members, and Reg 19s (relief), followed by those who have already paid their 2024 dues. For those who have paid, I thank you. I expect to mail the first batch of dues cards in mid-November.

Part of my job as secretary is building manager. The bulk of this is keeping track of the building schedule and working as the point of contact between our users and the trustees. As part of this, I make sure the users' keys work for when they have scheduled the building. We do have a couple of outside groups (HOA boards in the neighborhood) that have been long time friends of the lodge. This is part of our outreach into our local community and developing friendships with our neighbors. For some of our users we need to schedule some one from the lodge to be a keyholder-to let them in, lock up afterward, and be there if they have any issues. The other part of this is coordinating with all the folks who need to come in for our routine maintenance work and inspections. Our bugman comes in monthly, our HVAC folks come in guarterly, and then we have the annual fire alarm, sprinkler, and hood inspections. Plus we need to schedule repairs for anything else that breaks. I am working with our plumber for a couple of inside jobs.

In the past we had a "Thursday" crew that took care of some of the routine maintenance in the building-changing filters in the kitchen, replacing burnt out lights, and other routine repairs that needed to be done. I have gotten real good at replacing batteries around the lodge, all the way from the security system to the clocks, thermostats, and toilets in the bath room. By the way, we are looking at replacing the last two units in the men's room with traditional manual units instead of the automatic flushing. Parts are far cheaper. For anyone who is interested in helping help, please let either myself or WM Sam know. If we get enough folks to help out, there might even be coffee and donuts before we start work.

In closing, I really enjoy being your lodge secretary. I feel it gives me a chance to really support the lodge as well as help brothers who need help. The best of both worlds. To quote my mentor, "I love the fraternity!"

#### Some thoughts from the Grand West.

I must preface this article by relating a situation that recently occurred at my home lodge, Tucson #4. The Worshipful Master asked me in the dining room if I could do a Masonic education presentation on etiquette in lodge and one of the brothers present burst out, and rightfully so, in derisive laughter. Apparently, I am known for inappropriate behavior in lodge and upon some short reflection that is certainly true. There have been numerous occasions when my mouth was in gear but my brain was in neutral. However, proper etiquette is in fact important to me and the brother's derisive laughter caused me to do some reflection and some research. So here goes some thoughts gleaned about protocol and etiquette from an article in the Montana Freemason written by Lewis Smith, GM of Montana in 2016.

The Worshipful Master is in charge of the lodge meeting. An obvious statement but one that requires some explanation. He works his way through the agenda and will call on various brothers to present reports. The secretary has a large part in the agenda but also the treasurer and the different committee reports from the committee chairman or member. The work of the committees should not be done in lodge but beforehand with a simple report on what has been done, what needs to be done and, if necessary, any guidance needed from the WM or the lodge. Discussion can follow which is directed by the WM who controls who speaks. There is no Robert's Rules of Order in operation here – the WM is in charge. He may close discussion, refuse to recognize a brother who wishes to speak and even gavel down a brother as he deems fit.

So, when, and how does a brother speak in lodge? This is presented to all new Masons during the degrees but will be reiterated here. The brother should rise in place, give the due guard and sign of the degree on which the lodge is open, wait to be recognized by the WM, and then speak directly to the WM, not to a committee chair or secretary or any other brother. Questions for clarification are addressed to the WM who may then direct the appropriate brother to respond. Brothers should not rise repeatedly to speak on an issue but organize their thoughts, present their comments in a non-adversarial manner, succinctly and just once. This allows an orderly discussion, not a free-for-all of remarks back and forth between brothers.

It is inappropriate to have side conversations which are disruptive and show disrespect to the WM and the other brothers. At the opening of lodges in Arizona the Junior Warden will announce that the WM is about to open a lodge and the brothers are instructed "Of this take due notice and govern yourselves accordingly." Certainly, from that point on proper etiquette and protocol should be followed. It is also inappropriate to have a cell phone open during lodge - on silent mode, so that proper attention is given to the Worshipful Master, and during degrees to the participants.

We should all have some sympathy for the Junior Past Worshipful Master in one area. He just spent the last few years going through the chairs and learning the ritual to open and close lodge and obligate candidates for all three degrees. He knows the ritual, worked very hard to learn it and when he hears a mistake, he is often the first to blurt out a prompt, which may very well be incorrect. There should be one and only one prompter in lodge, designated by the WM, who is allowed to have the ritual book open, so that he will not give an incorrect prompt. All other ritual books should be closed – an open lodge is not the time to learn the ritual.

Who is the last to speak? The WM, or the Grand Master if present, is the last to speak before closing the lodge. Again, side conversations, comments, whispers from the sidelines detract from the solemnity of our ritual. The closing prayer reminds us of our obligations as Mason and bears repeating and listening by us all.
