








From The West




So, release the Kraken (your masonic creativity) and challenge us with an abundance of material. The deadline is the 15th of the month prior to publication.

From The Secretary

The summer is winding down and we are entering the last third of the masonic year. Time flies when we are having fun. A couple of my intended projects this summer were overcome by events. We had some minor plumbing issues with the building which took time to get fixed. We hosted the Grand Trustees and the Long Range Planning Committee for their July meetings to name a couple of the items. I spent a lot of time tracking down missing brothers. I sent out suspension warnings to 10 brothers, 4 of them either came back or were forwarded to a new address. It is important you let the lodge know when you move, change phone numbers, or emails. If you have activated your account in Grand View, you can do this yourself. If you make a change, I will get a message that you did.

As we are 2/3 of the way through the year, I will give share some of the numbers of the lodge. We started the year with 230 members. We lost 5 to the celestial lodge above and 2 requested withdrawals. For gains, we raised 3 new master masons. If you are doing the math, this brings us to 226 members. Of this number, 18 are Senior Life Members and 10 are Regulation 19 (Relief). That brings the number to 198. Of this number 46 are Perpetual Members which leaves us with 152 dues paying members.

For degree work we have conferred 7 degrees—1 Entered Apprentice, 3 Fellowcraft, and three Master Mason. In addition we have a lodge in the Buffalo, NY are doing courtesy work for us on one of our EAs who moved there. For candidates, we have 1 waiting for the degrees, 2 Entered Apprentices, and 2 Fellowcrafts.

On a regular basis, I get emails from the Grand Secretary with information that I am requested to distribute to the brethren. I usually do this through our email program as an additional email (or campaign). This will only go to our members and not to everyone on the email list. Speaking of emails, neither Grand Lodge, Worshipful Master or

other officers send out any requests for funds, the purchase of gift cards, or the like. As was mentioned in an earlier email, this type of request will only come from my lodge email address in a format previously mentioned.

We have received several requests through the proper channels for relief. Two of these were for the fires in Maui. One came from the Grand Lodge of Hawaii and a second, which will be read at the stated meeting, is from the Masonic Services Association.

For those brothers who have rituals, I have received 25 copies of the changes to the ritual approved at the last annual communication. These are replacement pages that you simply swap out. If you haven't received yours, see me and I will give you a copy. If we run out, I'll get more (just like Doritos).

Now that we are back in almost normal operations, I will go back to my "normal" days at the lodge. During the morning for Mondays (afternoons for the 2nd and 4th Mondays) and Thursday mornings. I usually stick around until about 1 pm after the mail comes. If you would like I can make an appoint. Please call first if you are stopping by.
